Summary

Overview

This transcript records a conversation between **Ronnie Powls**, a Hull University graphic design student, and **Heather Gibson** from **Fitmums & Friends**, discussing the group's **Forest Project** and overall community work. The meeting was part of Ronnie's research for the **Ideas Fund / Participatory Collective** website project that connects 16 different community organizations.

Key Points

Background & Origins

- **Fitmums & Friends** was founded by **Sam Barlow**, a working mother who started a local running group to meet people, later expanding across **Hull and East Riding**.
- What began as small community runs evolved into a registered charity in 2017.
- The charity now runs running clubs, walking groups, Nordic walking, cycling, and sessions for visually impaired participants in partnership with Sight Support.

Bereavement & Forest Project

- After Sam's husband died of cancer four years ago, she created new bereavement support programs.
- These include:
 - o Bereavement walks (Hull University and Beverley)
 - Yoga sessions for those grieving
 - The Forest Project, developed with Humber Forest School's Cindy and funded by The Ideas Fund.
- The project provides bereavement support for children in a forest environment, using nature-based activities (den building, crafts, fires) alongside emotional discussions around a campfire.
- Sessions are run by trained Forest Leaders and Bereavement Support Facilitators (BSFs).

Structure & Safeguarding

- The Forest Project uses **paid staff**, not volunteers, except one vetted DBS-checked helper.
- All staff have safeguarding and first aid training.
- The program runs for **four consecutive Saturdays** with a weekly theme (e.g., memories, worries, feelings).

- **No pressure** is placed on children to speak—support is flexible and can be 1-to-1 or group-based.
- **Neurodivergent children** (ADHD, autism) are supported through pre-assessments with parents and a **comic-style guide** explaining what to expect.

Partnerships & Community Links

- Fitmums has collaborated with **Sight Support**, **Beverley Grammar School**, and **South Hunsley School** on grief-related projects.
- They're trying to engage **university students** through bereavement walks.
- They provide families with a **resource sheet** listing other bereavement and mental health services.
- Although listed, they have **no major collaboration with Mind** yet.
- The website has been recently **updated for easier access** to Forest Project information, and a **revamp** is planned.

Challenges

- The biggest issue is **visibility** many families don't know the Forest Project exists.
- They rely entirely on grants and donations, making sustainability difficult.
- They aim to improve recognition among schools, doctors, and health visitors.
- Heather noted a need for **parent bereavement groups**, but scheduling and funding remain barriers.

Vision & Goals

• The main mission:

"Providing bereavement support for children in a safe, natural environment."

- Future goals include:
 - o Expanding outreach and awareness.
 - o Establishing parent support groups alongside children's sessions.
 - Continuing to refine activities and structure based on feedback and experience.
- The team emphasizes **nature**, **activity**, **and emotional openness** as tools for healing.

Ronnie's Project Discussion

- Ronnie shared logo and website design concepts for The Participatory Collective.
- Heather's feedback:
 - Favoured the **first and second logo concepts**, particularly the **jigsaw and "connected threads"** designs.

- Suggested integrating the "C" into the jigsaw logo.
- o Preferred the **first website layout**, where users click directly on each community to learn more.
- o Also liked the **interactive map idea** to show where each group is based.
- Recommended combining both ideas a front-page jigsaw view with a map as a secondary page.

Conclusion

Fitmums & Friends has grown from a simple running club into a major community charity offering holistic support — physical, social, and emotional. The **Forest Project** stands out for its creative approach to **children's bereavement**, combining outdoor activity, emotional sharing, and peer connection. Their main challenges lie in **funding** and **awareness**, but their strong ethos of community, empathy, and inclusion continues to drive their work forward.

 And we offer unique shepherding system. So if you get too far in front, you come back and be grouped with the back of the group, so nobody's ever left behind.

 And so that's how it all started. And then we also have cycling groups now, Nordic walking, walking groups. We also have groups that work with Sight Support for visually impaired people.

She does a session with them on a Wednesday where they go and do strength and conditioning in the gym, and then they have a session on Friday at Costello track where they walk or run around the track. And that's been amazing. I've heard so many good things.

 And they have an activity each week and they have a theme for the week, so then they'll talk about memories, worries and all sort of feelings, and then they can do that round the campfire.

I know you work primarily with children going through grief. I read that you go against the more 'traditional route' obviously being outside and whatnot. What do you do if a kid doesn't respond to that?

I know your main mission is to help children through grief. So, what if, they're in the forest setting and it's not really working for them?

So all of the children really that have come, have engaged with the with the project. I think sometimes

children have taken a little bit longer to maybe open up. There's absolutely no pressure from us if they want to open up, they can. But there's no pressure to.

Heather Gibson 16:32 And.

It's very much done on the first session that it's getting to know each other. It's quite light hearted on the first session and then if, when they're talking around the campfire, if there's a question or there's something that they don't want to talk about, there's no pressure to join in.

And we had one little boy who came along, and he didn't speak for... So, it's four consecutive Saturday in the forest but he didn't really engaged in the first three and then on the last week he brought a photo album and he just talked for the whole session and the staff said it was amazing.

 And they were like, he just needs another three sessions now. It's almost like that was that was sort of the beginning for him. And sometimes they don't want to talk as part of the group, but they're brilliant on a 1 to 1.

 Yeah, exactly. The activities that we have with them, it's done as a group, but then it can be also be carried out one to one as well and we go for walks as well, which is a really good time for them to talk. So, some children haven't opened up, but there's no pressure to.

I can't think of the word. It's sort of agencies and other charities that we're aware of that can provide support. So, we send a list of other places that they can also access for support if they feel that they would, you know, they need some more support.






