# **Summary**

#### Overview

The transcript records a conversation between **Ronnie Powls**, a graphic design student from Hull University, and **Terry Sullivan**, a community leader from the **HU4 Community Trust** (formerly a community group). The discussion focuses on the Trust's origins, activities, challenges, and goals, as well as Ronnie's student project to design a website/app for community inclusion.

# **Key Points**

### **Background & Origins**

- Terry and his ex-wife Dawn started the **HU4 Community project in 2019** after noticing severe social neglect in the Boothferry Estate and surrounding HU4 area.
- They discovered widespread **deprivation**, with **63% of Pickering Ward** among the most deprived 20% in the UK.
- Began by **running a food bank from their garage**, growing steadily through community trust.

# **Development & Services**

- By 2021, they moved into a Council-provided shop, now serving as a hub combining a café and food bank.
- Currently operate on a **rolling one-year Council tenancy**, which restricts access to major funding (e.g., National Lottery).
- They are bidding for a **larger Rent Office space** to expand and include:
  - o Health checks (blood pressure, heart rate monitoring)
  - o Drop-in doctors and health support
  - Larger social and educational programs

# **Community Activities**

- Food bank with a no-questions policy to ensure dignity and trust.
- Weekly sessions:
  - o Tuesday: Natta-Bags group with meal (£3 charge, free in winter via funding).
  - Wednesday: Citizens Advice drop-ins.
  - o *Thursday*: Quiz and bingo sessions with meals.
- Radio project involving local schoolchildren, encouraging digital participation.
- **Mini library** outside the hub—donated and community-supported, vital during COVID.
- **Dementia support projects**, including knitting "serenity blankets" for hospices.

### **Challenges**

- Limited space prevents further partnerships (e.g., with Age UK).
- Inability to secure long-term tenancy blocks significant funding.
- Concern about **youth disengagement** and community fragmentation.
- Noted social issues: loneliness, mental health problems, obesity, drugs, and lack of youth facilities.
- Desire to **rebrand** to appeal to younger demographics, as "Community Trust" sounds outdated.

#### **Vision & Goals**

- "Even though we're a small community, we have big ideas."
- Want to:
  - o Expand beyond food support into health, education, and connection.
  - o Encourage volunteers with diverse skills.
  - o Rebuild intergenerational community bonds.
  - Secure sustainable premises and funding.
- Hope The Participatory Collective and Ideas Fund raise visibility and support.

# Ronnie's Project

- Ronnie presents **logo and website design ideas** for The Participatory Collective, featuring interconnected themes (hands, jigsaw pieces, inclusivity).
- Terry offers feedback—prefers the "linked hands" design and expresses appreciation.
- Grants Ronnie permission to use the interview content for his academic project.

# **Conclusion**

The HU4 Community Trust is a small but impactful grassroots organization fighting deprivation in Hull's HU4 area through food support, social activities, and inclusivity. Their main challenges are limited space, funding restrictions, and community disengagement. Despite this, they remain hopeful, proactive, and ambitious about growth and local impact.

Yeah, but we're no longer together, so.

  A local council and we obviously went campaigning and door knocking around the estate and what we found is that even though at the moment I live pretty nearby the estate, there was no reason to go up to the HU4 area.

  And what we found was frightening. There's nothing up there at all. So we sent a 600 signature petition to Emma Hardy, our local MP, who brought it up in the Houses of Parliament, asking the.

  Conservative government to release funds for the Labour Council, so we could work on the shortfall of

the menaces in the area. Well, it came back through a guy called Richie Sunak. There was some progress.

  What we didn't particularly know at the time, but have later found out since is that the 63% of Pickering Ward is in the top or the bottom, whichever way you want to say it, the top 20% of deprivation in the country. There's a pocket in Hull, you know Summer Groves, Pickering Rd, Hesley Rd esc.

  All the off chutes, that having nothing. So, I think that has a detrimental effect on Pickering and getting any benefits or meaningful resources.

  So we started the Food Bank from our garage and when we initially set off, we did 6 a week.

  It was slow, but the trust has been built up over the years. We don't criticise people and we don't we don't play God. We don't say you can or can't have one. Everybody who comes actually gets one without any questions asked. We started that back in 2020, I think.

  - Then we got the shop offered off the Labour Council.

  Yeah, that was on one of my questions, yeah, because I read that you opened the cafe.

Yeah, well, yeah. Well, we call it a hub, it's a cafe and a food bank. We've been there ever since 2021, but one of the first things we found is when we got it, it wasn't big enough.

  It's not big enough. I mean it's like a front room in a house, you know, in the normal house. It's not a big mansion.

  We've reached a level of food support where everybody knows we're there. So, we're there and that's been passed on to me by few people. Some people don't particularly use it, but it's there for those who need it.

  The bottom 20% of deprived areas for obesity, loneliness, isolation, mental health, drugs. The one of the things what we found in that that the housing stock in Boothferry Estate is pretty good. It's not a housing issue.

  What they haven't invested in is the people. They've put no investments in the area at all. So that's where we're at.

  But yeah, well, that kind of led into one of my questions. I know that you went from Community group to Community Trust with a slight name change if I'm correct. But obviously I assume that it's just down to charity status.

  No, the thing is we became a Community Trust when we got charity status, we've got charity status in 2023.

  So we changed the name because it's not a community group, it's a Community Trust now. Do you want the charity number, does it matter? No.

  So we got that pretty quick. To be fair, it didn't take us that long. Only a few months. I mean, sometimes it takes years.

  Yeah.

  What's one of the problems we've got is the premises. We're in a Council premises and we are on a year's rolling contract.

  - They could throw us out but it also means we can't get big funding.
- RP RONNIE POWLS 9:08 Yeah.
- Terry Sullivan 9:11
  From lottery grants, etc and all the other big funders, because we haven't got a 10 15 year long tenancy.

- Terry Sullivan 9:37
  We're currently applying for a bid for an old Rent Office space, so we can finally expand. We should hear about that later this week.

  Hmm.
  Yeah.

  If we get this space, then we can start to expand more with providing health services. From example, like heart rate monitors, monitoring blood pressure stuff like that.

  Yeah.

  Yeah, even stuff like defibrillators and stuff like that, yeah.

  Yeah. I mean, people can come here and get what they need. So, we've got a band of trustees, with about 6 or 7 of us, all working and hoping that this bid goes through.

  But, we're in the hands of the Council now.

  Yeah and the Council can take its time.

  - Well originally, they offered us a set of four garages which wouldn't have been any bigger than what we've got now. So, then they offered us another venue, but it was on the outskirts of the HU4 area and was so out of sight that it was useless.

  You want a community hub that's visible. You don't want to be walking miles, or relying on public transport to get help. So initially the Rent Office wasn't up for grabs at all. They were adamant that the council were going to build on it, and then something happened, and it suddenly became available.

  So, as far I know, it's between us and four other groups trying to win the bid for the space. So we'll see.

  Yeah, well, that answers some of the questions.

  Well, moving on. You've talked about food banks and stuff. What other services do you provide to the community?
- Terry Sullivan 12:37
  On a Wednesday, we have citizen advice come in and talk to anyone in need. We were one of the last areas to get access to this and to the advice.
- RP RONNIE POWLS 12:42 Hmm.
- Terry Sullivan 12:55
  That's become very popular. We also do Natta-Bags Tuesday, and a lot of people come in for that, but we're limited on space. We think we could get more in, but there isn't room. They have a dinner.

  Sometimes we do crafts, or they just sit and talk all depending what mood they're in.

  We give them a dinner, a pudding and two cups for tea. And I think we charged £3.00. We're not even making it for that amount.
- RONNIE POWLS 13:26 Yeah, yeah, definitely.

  On the Thursday, they have a quiz of 20 questions and bingo, which goes down well. And again, they get the dinner and two cups of tea.

  But we also just got some funding through, so that everyone's meals are Free during the winter months. And, we have a leaflet that needs to go out this week, explain the changes.

  So hopefully that will increase the footfall on a Wednesday and a Friday. Plus, we're trying to get a radio station up and running. Which we already have some people involved in that.

  We've been in contact with the schools and have got some school children involved. We'll be doing that on Wednesday. So, we sort of record what they've got to say on certain days, and it airs the following week on our radio app. At the minute it's all about trying to encourage people to download the app and listen in.

  So, yeah. We're trying to evolve from leaflets, which I think is vital. Because we need to adapt.

  So, I think I read that over 30% of your members live outside of the HU4 Community.

  Yeah, it's quite high. I mean that covers families as well as single people.

  Yeah, it's quite a large amount.

  Yeah, that's why we're contemplating opening on Christmas morning or Christmas Day for a dinner.
  But we don't know yet.

  I mean, they come from. They come from all over because it is a good full food parcel to get when you're in a bad position.

  Well, I think because this sounds awful, but I think that they play the system, and they need more food, or supplies or support.

  Well, we've had contact with Age UK, but we can't really do anything until we get a bigger premises.
  As currently we don't have enough space for them to come in and do activities with member of the community.

  With Hull Libraries. We have a small library outside of our hub and they've helped provide books in the past.

  We also have people bringing books in. At Christmas they also help by providing books to give as presents to children, which was great.

  - People have told me that our little library really helped them, especially during covid. Because people could walk down from their house and take a book home. It gave them a tiny bit of escapism.

I've spoken to them two or three times and they've agreed to come and support us once we have the space. Unfortunately, they're currently two buses away, which won't work.

  Yeah, with the bus has been so expensive now as well, I can see that been a big deterrent.

  Yeah, I mean boredom is a massive killer, especially if you've got kids that are more inclined to go down the trouble route when they're bored.

  Yeah. We've been here for six years now and I've seen many kids go down the troublesome route because they've not had access to anything else.

  There's kids that are fine, but I think we need to start helping the ones that aren't more.

  Especially when they're at an impressionable age, when you van help educate them on what's right and what's wrong.

  Yeah, I think it is really difficult to get young people involved in community work, or even for them to hear what someone in that position might have to say. I think the best place to start is through the schools.
